The 1969 Session of the Minnesota Legislature enacted more pension legislation of fundamental and long range significance than any single Session since 1931 when pension plans were first made available to employees of state and local governments. A possible exception is the 1957 Session when the Legislature enacted measures designed to establish responsible financing of public employees' pensions.

This Session created a Minnesota Adjustable Fixed Benefit Fund under the State Board of Investment to be a single fully funded trust fund covering the pensions of all persons retired from:

- The Minnesota State Retirement System (MSRS)
- The Teachers Retirement Association (TRA)
- The Public Employees Retirement Association (PERA)
- The Minnesota Highway Patrol and State Police Officers Fund
- The Minneapolis Municipal Employees Retirement Fund

This fund is designed for the purpose of combating inflation by increasing pensions through investment return rather than by hoping for subsequent additional public gratuities.

Chapter 485, the Teachers' Retirement Improvement Act of 1969, made the TRA benefit program one of the most flexible and versatile pension plans in the nation. A series of options will permit each teacher considerable choice as to the nature of retirement provisions to be received. Benefits of most presently retired teachers were increased. All retirements since July 1, 1967 will receive increased benefits and future cervice will accrue benefits at a higher rate.

The Minnesota State Police Officers' Fund and the Minnesota Highway Patrol Fund were merged into a single fund. A substantial increase in pension benefits was included in the enactments.

The Fire and Police Guidelines Act of 1969, Chapter 223, was the first requirement by the Legislature of minimum standards of financial responsibility on the part of all local pension funds for paid firemen and policemen. The act requires ultimate compliance with minimum standards, but permits a series of steps for these local funds to reach the standards. The services of the State Board of Investment are made available to local police and fire pension funds.

Administrative and benefit improvements were made in both the MSRS and PERA laws.

The 1969 Session laws include 80 chapters dealing with state or local pension funds, but the significance and long range effect of the Minnesota Adjustable Fixed Benefit Fund, the Teachers Retirement Improvement Act of 1969 and the Police and Fire Guidelines Act of 1969 will unquestionably have basic and lasting impact on future pension developments.

The 1969 Session instructed that the Legislative Retirement Study Commission give special attention to the PERA law and provisions, to the Minnesota Highway Patrol Retirement law, and similarly to the Minneapolis Municipal Employees Retirement provisions.
